Thank you all for your service today. I just wanted to give you a quick update on SB3004 Presidential Candidate Amendments (Knudson, P.). We have no objections to this legislation.

I have spoken with Mark Thomas regarding their intended administration of this legislation. He told me that there is nothing in the legislation that obligates the Democratic Party to utilize the regular primary election for Presidential candidates but makes it an option that we can choose if desired. Regardless of the use of the primary, presidential candidates will be placed on the general election ballot if certified by letter in the normal manner. SB3004 does not address the date of that certification letter which was changed from Sept 8 to Aug 31 in a bill passed during the last general session of legislation in response to the federal MOVE Act. Consequently, we still have the problem mentioned below. Mr. Thomas indicated that he hopes that issue could be fixed during the 2012 general session.

Thank you so much for your quick response. I'm copying some of my colleagues on this email since they might know more than I do about why this issue has not been included (in bold below). I'll also see what I can do to resolve this matter.

I need to look closer at the Presidential bill.

Mark Thomas did ask some questions about why presidential candidates had not had to file like other candidates and told me that there would be something on the Call to allow a party to use the regular primary.

At first glance, the bill looks to be exactly what is purported (an optional -- not mandatory -- presidential primary that parties could choose to utilize). The Utah Democrats will not utilize it in 2012. It falls outside the end of the window for presidential contests and, of course, is well after the convention date where delegates are selected. The Utah GOP possibly could use it since their rules allow the national delegates to be selected first since they do a winner-take-all system.

I am deeply concerned that it does not appear to address the issue that I have repeatedly raised. The current final certification date to place candidates on the ballot is August 31. Our presidential and vice presidential nominee will not be selected until Sept 6 at the earliest and assuming everything goes in a normal manner (as opposed to the historical 20+ ballots with dark horse candidates at a national convention). The old law was Sep 8 to accommodate the Bush re-elect and McCain conventions that started the Sep convention tradition. Now that it is Obama, the standards have changed to an earlier date. (In all fairness, the Aug 31 was in response to federal law, the MOVE Act, that has screwed up the caucus and convention dates for 2012 due to having to move up the primary certification dates earlier in the election cycle.)

Currently we are in a position where we will have to certify our nominee to the State of Utah before the nominee is actually chosen (the GIVE 'EM OUR BEST GUESS solution) or the State of Utah does not want to risk embarrassment for not having the Democratic nominees for POTUS/VPOTUS on the ballot and accepts the certification late (the LEGAL NIGHTMARE option where potential law suits abound and a judge perhaps (?) gives in to common sense) or the State of Utah and the Utah Democrats uphold the rules and the Democratic nominees are just left off the ballot (the DEMOCRATS CAN'T WIN ANYWAY SO WHAT DOES IT MATTER solution).

Everybody is banking on the BEST GUESS. It will probably work for 2012 but not for the future beyond that. It might not work for 2012 if -- God forbid -- history takes its own course (a new VP choice or health or mortality issues or political upheaval).

Hi Patrice,

I just left Pat Jones a voice message regarding increased costs for adding a presidential primary to the regular June Primary. It would become a statewide primary versus some portions, but it could be that anyway with a senate, governor's race, etc.

The increased cost would occur for a significantly higher turnout than we see in a regular primary, which would require us to add more poll workers and voting machines. We estimate it will cost an additional 10% or \$70,000.00 for Salt Lake County.

Hi Patrice,

Yes, that is an estimate. If Mitt Romney is on the ballot, turnout will be much larger and the costs could be even higher. We would probably also need to increase early voting locations, add more temporaries to staff phones and process absentees, etc.

Won't the GOP candidate be decided by June with all the other states having earlier primaries? That happened in 2000 the first time we held a Western Presidential Primary in March. By that time, Bush was already the candidate and the state spent about \$600,000 on a primary that didn't matter. They moved the Western Presidential Primary back to February in 2008 so the decision wouldn't already be made.

Dear Friends,

This Friday may be the last opportunity for public input on Utah's new U.S. Congressional Maps! We made a difference last night by citizens showing up and asking the Legislature to hold off until public input, now we need you to come to the Capitol Friday and give your input. At 9 a.m., we hope you and everyone will fill up the seats in the Capitol's Room 445, and hopefully with so many of us, we will flow into the hallways to have the chance to voice our opinions.

We have a plan to maximize the impact with all the people that show up...

We are asking the Legislature for compromise.

A compromise map first submitted by Senator Ben McAdams on Tuesday was rejected, but few citizens were there to show support. We would like to support this map as revised on Friday. If we can get twenty, forty, sixty, eighty people to attend, here's the plan:

First, check out McAdams' map: <http://www.redistrictutah.com/maps/congress-sen-mcadams-06-10411>

This map may be disappointing for everyone that wanted a donut hole map. We know. We're disappointed. Senator McAdams is disappointed. But he drew this map with Republicans in a bipartisan effort. It conforms to the Republican urban/rural mix, yet doesn't sacrifice SL County. It keeps many more cities together than the front running Senate and House plans, including cities in Salt Lake and Utah Counties.

So here's what we're thinking:

Kelli Lundgren from RepresentMeUtah! will go up to the podium first when they ask for public comment on McAdams' map. She will thank the redistricting committee for giving the public one more opportunity to comment. She then holds up a copy of McAdam's map, signed on the bottom by herself. She then states, "Compromise is good politics and is what democracy is all about. Accept this map for the good of all citizens. Please vote for this map in the Senate and House. Please do it so we can all move on. Represent Me Utah!"

Kelli then puts her signed copy of the McAdams map down on the podium, says thank you, and gets up.

Then, one by one, citizens come up to the podium, state their name, state what group they are associated with, or that they are a "citizen," and say "I am here to ask for compromise." Then, they set their signed copy of McAdams' map on the stack on the podium. We line up, and one by one, we go through quickly. Those that already signed, STAND somewhere behind the line and wait for everyone to sign and all sit down together.

And thank you for your efforts too. I don't envy anyone on the redistricting committee. I hope you are somewhat pleased with the House and Senate maps.

RepMe's plans are much larger than redistricting. Realistically, we didn't know if we would have any effect on the process. Hi David--

I apologize for not getting back to you sooner! As you note, I did take your Garber D map and tweak it some in Salt Lake and Utah counties. But it's a good map and I appreciate very much your work in putting it together. I don't know if you are going to be able to make it to the redistricting committee hearing tomorrow but I'm going to present it then. The more positive input we can get for it, the better.

The process we followed in formulating and passing the state school board, senate and house maps was pretty good, all things considered. The sad reality is that the process we've seen in the last couple of weeks with the congressional map has been much less so. There has been way too much focus on information provided by outside partisan groups such as both state parties. Way too much emphasis on figuring out how to put together four districts that protect or expose Matheson, carve out districts to the advantage of various contenders for the new fourth seat, etc. Those political considerations have really overwhelmed other, more valid, considerations. I worry that much of the good work the committee did leading up to the last couple of weeks has been lost in the obviously partisan considerations that have become so prominent in coming up with the congressional map.

Thank you again for your attention to the redistricting process in the past few months David. I plan on making sure everyone knows about your hard work and good efforts tomorrow!

Utah Democrats Challenge Republican Leadership to Compromise on Redistricting

SALT LAKE CITY – Utah Democrats issued a challenge and invitation to Republican legislative leadership today. Speaking on behalf of all Utahans, party chair Jim Dabakis challenged the majority party to pledge to "OPEN ALL" of their discussions about redistricting and to seek a bipartisan solution for the Congressional maps.

"Tuesday was a fiasco. It was a waste of taxpayer dollars, and it showed the dirty underbelly of politics and an intensely partisan process," stated Dabakis this morning. "No more secrets, no deals, no trade-offs in the closed Republican caucus rooms. No more last minute maps whipped up behind closed doors without involving the public."

"We have two weeks. Let's open the closed doors! Unafraid of the light, Democratic meetings, caucuses, and conversations are open to the public--on behalf of all Utahans we implore that Republicans join us in letting the public watch Utah's business be conducted," Dabakis said. "Let's rise above the partisan bickering and develop a truly bipartisan map. One that represents communities. One that represents Utah. Utah deserves better. As leaders, we must do better."

On air, Dabakis reiterated that the Democrats are willing and want to work with Republicans and the public to develop a congressional map. He also reaffirmed the Senate and House Democrats' call from Tuesday that insisted any map brought before the legislative bodies must first be brought to the public.

"Utah expects Democrats and Republicans to work together in an open and transparent process. Lets sit down and develop a bipartisan map. We can do better, we must do better. How amazing would it be for Utah to lead the nation in an open and fair redistricting process? If Utah Republicans and Democrats work together, we could inspire bipartisanship across the country and end the national stalemate. We will renew voters' faith in their elected leaders."



Dear Representative or Senator:

I am pleased that the legislature has 'stepped back to take another look' relative to redistricting, as it was clear from the map under consideration at that time did not represent the concerns of many Utah citizens. That is, the map did not keep communities of interest intact in any meaningful sense of the word. Specifically, the 'pizza slice' approach to Salt Lake County completely disenfranchised that population by carving it into four pieces and linking three to rural areas with enough population to overpower the urban voice.

Unfortunately, it appears that the 'revised' plan, developed behind closed doors and without public input only worsens the situation by linking the new District 4 to rural areas as well. This approach serves no one well -- urban or rural -- and represents a total travesty that can only be described as blatant gerrymandering for partisan gain. The comments of Becky Lockhart and others chastising questioners who dared suggest that this approach disenfranchised voters and weakened democracy by replying that 'this is a Republic' (don't you know stupid) and 'no Republican or Democrat' will be deprived of a vote under this plan' only underscores the blatant disregard of this legislature for those you are supposed to represent and a lack of understanding of many prior court rulings that underscore the importance of preserving communities of interest in order to protect the ability of those groups to be effectively heard. Additionally, claims that you 'listened to the public' have been nullified by your subsequent redrawing of the lines behind closed doors and the destruction by some members of email communications relevant to the process. Prior to this, efforts to silence the voice of Utahns by creating impossibly high barriers to citizen petitions only further underscores this disregard. The voices of the many thousands who signed a petition asking for an independent redistricting commission have been ignored. I am confident that, had the bar not been set quite so high and had online signatures been acceptable, the initiative would have been on the ballot and would have passed.

Please astonish me and truly step back far enough to consider and implement a plan that does not disenfranchise the urban majority population of this state. We will be heard -- if not now, at the ballot box come November.



OK Kelli, the revision should be on line at redistrictutah.com in the next hour or so. The name will be "Garber Modified King" or something like that. Feel free to do whatever you would like to get the word out to your folks and all the other citizen groups out there about the map.

It splits SL County twice and Utah County only twice. It maintains the small split of Davis County. It has a very clean line along Redwood Road on the North end of SL County and 1300 West on the South end of SL County. I tried to keep municipalities together in Utah County South of American Fork. It has a rural/urban mix in all four districts. I don't like that but I'm realistic: no map is getting any support from Rs unless it does that.

It isn't as compact as the map we discussed at the last redistricting mtg but it is more compact than any alternative I've seen being discussed in the last few days and it addresses the Speaker's concern. I like it. I think it is significantly better than any alternative I've seen from the Republicans. If the legislators get significant positive feedback from citizens between now and Monday (emails and phone calls), I think we have a shot at altering the current direction my colleagues want to go. Think about what happened with HB 477.

If you like this map, I think you need to have as much pressure and emails as possible before the Monday morning Republican caucuses at the beginning of the special session. If you wait until after the session and a map is adopted (as will likely, or at least possibly, occur during the Monday special session), it will be too late.

We're going to try to issue a press release today to try and get some media interest. I'm also going to be emailing the map to all the members of the House and Senate today or early tomorrow to explain the strengths of the map and see if I can make a direct pitch to them that way.

I'm copying David Garber on this email. David, thank you again for your great work on this map in particular and on redistricting generally. I hope this revision of your map is something that you can support.

I believe the map you have come up with is the best one of the choices we have. My actual preference would be one that has 3 areas centered around the 3 metropolitan areas – Ogden/Logan, Salt Lake City and Orem/Provo with one being as close as possible to being an entirely rural district.

As you know, I've had the opportunity to work on the redistricting committee the last few months. It's been a great experience. One of the best things about our efforts on the School Board, Senate and House maps was working across the aisle to put together maps that both Republicans and Democrats felt, for the most part, reflected the redistricting principles we adopted in the Spring. I'm proud of the work the committee and the legislature did on those maps and I'll stand by them against any challenge.

I think we still have a chance to do that same thing in our work on the Congressional map. I write to ask for your support of a Congressional map that I believe represents the most realistic chance of getting both bipartisan and citizen support for our work.

One of the six final maps the redistricting committee focused on was drawn by David Garber from Utah County. David's "Garber D" map was the only citizen map among the final six. I am not a fan of the idea that Utah is best served with four districts mixing urban and rural. But I recognize that support in the legislature for that approach is strong. And among the maps that went with a rural/urban mix in each district, I liked David's the best.

It needed some work to get the population numbers down to a one person deviation but I tweaked it a little bit and presented it last week at our final redistricting committee meeting. In the committee hearing, Speaker Lockhart expressed concern about Utah County being split three ways. So I went in and made a few adjustments to eliminate that problem. OK Kelli, the revision should be on line at redistrictutah.com in the next hour or so. The name will be "Garber Modified King" or something like that. Feel free to do whatever you would like to get the word out to your folks and all the other citizen groups out there about the map.

It splits SL County twice and Utah County only twice. It maintains the small split of Davis County. It has a very clean line along Redwood Road on the North end of SL County and 1300 West on the South end of SL County. I tried to keep municipalities together in Utah County South of American Fork. It has a rural/urban mix in all four districts. I don't like that but I'm realistic: no map is getting any support from Rs unless it does that.

It isn't as compact as the map we discussed at the last redistricting mtg but it is more compact than any alternative I've seen being discussed in the last few days and it addresses the Speaker's concern. I like it. I think it is significantly better than any alternative I've seen from the Republicans. If the legislators get significant positive feedback from citizens between now and Monday (emails and phone calls), I think we have a shot at altering the current direction my colleagues want to go. Think about what happened with HB 477.

If you like this map, I think you need to have as much pressure and emails as possible before the Monday morning Republican caucuses at the beginning of the special session. If you wait until after the session and a map is adopted (as will likely, or at least possibly, occur during the Monday special session), it will be too late.

We're going to try to issue a press release today to try and get some media interest. I'm also going to be emailing the map to all the members of the House and Senate today or early tomorrow to explain the strengths of the map and see if I can make a direct pitch to them that way.

I'm copying David Garber on this email. David, thank you again for your great work on this map in particular and on redistricting generally. I hope this revision of your map is something that you can support.

My "Fair 4 Utah" plan was submitted to the Redistricting committee by Rep. Fred Cox at the Oct 7th meeting. This modified plan addresses many of the concerns.
This plan has key elements put together like no other plan. It is compromise plan fair 4 Utah.

The plan has been submitted but does not show on the redistrictUtah.com site. In place of a online link, images are attached.

In the Fair 4 Utah Counties and Cities plan:

- All of the counties are whole except Salt Lake.
- The Eastern, Southern, and Western Counties are grouped the same as the Rep. Sumsion map that passed the Senate. (If there is a better grouping, I can still make it work with Counties and Salt Lake county Cities together.)
- Salt Lake county is mostly split into two districts 84% with a small portion in the other two districts.
- All of the cities in Salt Lake county are whole except West Valley City and three others (South Salt Lake, Salt Lake City, and Herriman) with minor splits. As an example Salt Lake City is all in one district except about 100 people.
- In Salt Lake County the cities are grouped based on their similar shared communities.
- District 2, 3, and 4 are at the target mean of 690,971. District 1 is one over at 690,972.
