OK Kelli, the revision should be on line at redistrictutah.com in the next hour or so. The name will be "Garber Modified King" or something like that. Feel free to do whatever you would like to get the word out to your folks and all the other citizen groups out there about the map.

It splits SL County twice and Utah County only twice. It maintains the small split of Davis County. It has a very clean line along Redwood Road on the North end of SL County and 1300 West on the South end of SL County. I tried to keep municipalities together in Utah County South of American Fork. It has a rural/urban mix in all four districts. I don't like that but I'm realistic: no map is getting any support from Rs unless it does that.

It isn't as compact as the map we discussed at the last redistricting mtg but it is more compact than any alternative I've seen being discussed in the last few days and it addresses the Speaker's concern. I like it. I think it is significantly better than any alternative I've seen from the Republicans. If the legislators get significant positive feedback from citizens between now and Monday (emails and phone calls), I think we have a shot at altering the current direction my colleagues want to go. Think about what happened with HB 477.

If you like this map, I think you need to have as much pressure and emails as possible before the Monday morning Republican caucuses at the beginning of the special session. If you wait until after the session and a map is adopted (as will likely, or at least possibly, occur during the Monday special session), it will be too late.

We're going to try to issue a press release today to try and get some media interest. I'm also going to be emailing the map to all the members of the House and Senate today or early tomorrow to explain the strengths of the map and see if I can make a direct pitch to them that way.

I'm copying David Garber on this email. David, thank you again for your great work on this map in particular and on redistricting generally. I hope this revision of your map is something that you can support.

An article in the Deseret News (Saturday, Oct. 15, 2011) has us seriously concerned.

The general tone of the article is that the special session on Monday will be quick and that minds have already been made up. We would urge you to not act in haste. We know members are all aware that the Legislature is allowed up to thirty days to complete the redistricting task with a special session.

We recognize that the process of redistricting has been long and challenging, but to suggest that all discussion and examination of alternative maps is over seems premature. It's a disservice to the people of Utah, to not consider a map that will ensure the fairest representation.

The final map will serve the people of Utah for ten years. It deserves all the time and effort necessary to get the right map.

Democratic Legislators,

1. The McAdams / Cox "Modification of Hat and 3 Stripes" is apparently the only bipartisan map published since the late September adjournment. It is not as good as Rep. King's maps but as Sen. McAdams said at the SLC library last Tuesday, it may be the only one the supermajority will consider as a compromise.
2. By nearly any definition, the Republican-only West Valley to Payson doughnut-hole plans would create a gerrymander district around the hole, connecting south Davis County and San Juan County in an illogical way. I've stopped being angry, but please try to convince the Republicans to take a higher, less partisan road.

To get from Woods Cross to Blanding by logical highways, SB3002 and Rep. Sumsion's proposed Substitutions 15 and 16 would require the congressman or woman to cross district boundary lines 6 times. Under the Froerer-Adams-Modified Sumsion 15 map he or she would have to cross boundary lines 4 times, but district one would become gerrymandered. **THOSE PLANS ARE ALL EXTREMELY UNFAIR.** If it were me, I would vote no on all of them this week.

3. Rep. Sumsion explained at the library that the Utah House boundaries, mostly developed by him, were done in a bi-partisan way. He reported that 3 of the 4 eliminated/consolidated Utah house seats were in slower-growing Republican districts and only 1 in slower-growing Democratic districts. If true, congratulations to him and the Utah House and thanks to the Redistricting committee and all its work on all the maps.
4. Of all congress maps submitted in October by a legislator, only Rep. King's proposed Substitution 7 (the Garber Plan) meets the criteria that ought to be the only criteria for congressional boundaries other than equal population. Those criteria keep districts logical, compact, and keep most communities together. They also keep neighboring communities and counties together.

Rep. King's S12 looks like a fairly decent compromise between Garber's good points and replacing S3002's and Sumsion's West Valley-Provo doughnut hole with something more defensible. Would he be able to find some Republican in Central or southern Utah to sponsor it with him as bipartisan?

5. The only map I like better than Rep. King's is Brandon Plewe's NSEW modification of King's S07. It would split Salt Lake County north (SLC together) and south instead of east and west. Brandon's map, as he says,
 - a. Divides cities and counties as little as possible. Only 3 counties are divided (Davis, SL, Utah), and each is only divided between two districts. Only two cities are divided: Bountiful and Pleasant Grove.
 - b. Preserve rural regions: Northern Utah, Southern Utah, Uintah Basin
 - c. Make districts as compact (near-circular) as possible. Unfortunately, to keep SLC & WVC intact, I had to divide Salt Lake County into North and South"

I would add, because Brandon followed boundaries, there are also only three school districts that are divided between two districts—all in the largest districts in the state, Davis, Granite, and Alpine. Brandon accomplishes all this by throwing out the Redistricting committee's fetish of 2010 population variations at plus or minus 1 or 2 people or less. With Brandon at plus or minus 77 people and .01 of 1 percent he is well within statistical irrelevance. I am not a statistician, but I suspect anything up to .5 of one percent variance would be statistically irrelevant, legally supportable, and should be trumped by communities of interest.

Would one of you submit Brandon's map one and have a vote on it so it is in the record?

6. Rep. King's proposed Substitutions S05 & S08 with the big rural doughnut is way too big. The other flaws I see in it are the way it divides nearby regions such as Nephi from Payson, Tooele from West Valley, Park City from Salt Lake City and Morgan from Ogden.
7. Rep. Litvack's Substitution S09 tries to divide Salt Lake County north and south, like Plewe's map does, but to me it connects rural counties to SL County in an illogical way as the Republican maps—around Great Salt Lake and over snowbound back roads to connect Rich to Morgan to Salt Lake Counties and not connecting either with Cache, Weber or Summit Counties.

I also left comments about most of the plans at the Redistrict Utah site. Sorry this is so long, but I have (perhaps naïve) hope that some of you will read and act on the above as talking points this week. Thanks for all you do.

We have received our first request for legal research. As you all know, the legislature is trying to come up with redistricting maps. The UDLC has been in the forefront in the effort of making the Republican party draw fair, nonpartisan-based districts. As part of this effort, we have researched possible legal grounds on which to attack the new maps.

In response, the Republicans have now closed their redistricting meetings claiming an exemption based on "potential litigation". The UDLC has now been asked to provide a bullet point memo explaining Utah's open meeting laws and when/if an exemption exists in face of litigation. Does this assignment fall into anyone's expertise or is there anyone that would be able to quickly turn around a memo?

Please let me know if you are willing to take this assignment. There is some urgency, but a law review analysis is not needed. Thank you all in advance for your help.

Governor Herbert:

I ask that you veto the congressional map passed by the Legislature last night, which was created behind the closed doors of the Republican Caucus and made public shortly before being voted on -- as I understand it, many legislators had less than an hour to study the map before it was voted on. 
