





**Democratic Rep. Brian King offers a new and balanced map for Utah's congressional redistricting process**

Salt Lake City, Oct. 14, 2011 – Rep. Brian King, D-Salt Lake, with support of the Utah House Democratic Caucus, has presented a new congressional redistricting map for consideration Monday (Oct. 17) by the Utah Legislature.

King, a member of the state's redistricting committee, is relying heavily on Utah County citizen David Garber's map, which House Republicans have included in the six proposals currently under consideration. King has adjusted Garber's map to reflect a one-person deviation in population for all four districts. Additionally, his proposal would keep Utah County from being split three ways—an element that House Speaker Becky Lockhart has indicated the map must include.

"I like several things about this map," King said. "It splits no county more than two ways. Salt Lake, Utah and Davis counties are each split twice. Every other county remains whole."

Further, King said, his plan draws heavily from a citizen who took part in the online map drawing process.

“We should be proud that citizens have stepped up to participate in a process that will affect them for the next 10 years. This is a citizen map that really makes sense. It's also a compromise between what partisan Democrats and Republicans want as their dream product.”

King added that adopting the map would restore the credibility and good will that grew with the public during redistricting of the legislative and school board maps a few weeks ago. “Our work this Monday on the congressional maps should reflect openness and transparency and an end goal of truly representing the citizens of Utah,” he said.

In keeping with Democratic goals of bipartisan effort and transparency, King has vetted his map with House Republican leaders and has e-mailed all GOP legislators, urging them to seriously consider his plan.

The Utah House of Representatives met on Oct. 2 to adopt map for the state's four congressional districts. But late-night GOP wrangling over new maps ended with Speaker Lockhart's call for a recess until Oct. 17. Republican legislators have consistently said they require a map that reflects a mix of urban and rural populations in each district. Democrats have generally countered that the new districts should reflect communities of interest and have worked to keep Salt Lake County mostly intact within one urban district.

### **Utah Democrats Challenge Republican Leadership to Compromise on Redistricting**

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SALT LAKE CITY – Utah Democrats issued a challenge and invitation to Republican legislative leadership today. Speaking on behalf of all Utahans, party chair Jim Dabakis challenged the majority party to pledge to "OPEN ALL" of their discussions about redistricting and to seek a bipartisan solution for the Congressional maps.

"Tuesday was a fiasco. It was a waste of taxpayer dollars, and it showed the dirty underbelly of politics and an intensely partisan process," stated Dabakis this morning. "No more secrets, no deals, no trade-offs in the closed Republican caucus rooms. No more last minute maps whipped up behind closed doors without involving the public."

"We have two weeks. Let's open the closed doors! Unafraid of the light, Democratic meetings, caucuses, and conversations are open to the public---on behalf of all Utahans we implore that Republicans join us in letting the public watch Utah's business be conducted," Dabakis said. "Let's rise above the partisan bickering and develop a truly bipartisan map. One that represents communities. One that represents Utah. Utah deserves better. As leaders, we must do better."

On air, Dabakis reiterated that the Democrats are willing and want to work with Republicans and the public to develop a congressional map. He also reaffirmed the Senate and House Democrats' call from Tuesday that insisted any map brought before the legislative bodies must first be brought to the public.

"Utah expects Democrats and Republicans to work together in an open and transparent process. Lets sit down and develop a bipartisan map. We can do better, we must do better. How amazing would it be for Utah to lead the nation in an open and fair redistricting process? If Utah Republicans and Democrats work together, we could inspire bipartisanship across the country and end the national stalemate. We will renew voters' faith in their elected leaders."
